Maharashtra Police Academy Emergency Response Training

The Maharashtra Police Academy (MPA) in Nashik is the premier police training institution for the state, responsible for preparing police officers and constabulary in law enforcement, crisis management, modern policing methods, and field readiness. It hosts foundational and in-service training programs that include physical fitness, legal studies, tactical skills, and discipline for recruits and officers.

As part of the Chief Minister's 100-Day Programme — a state-level initiative aimed at fast-tracking key governance and public service outcomes — the Academy organised specialized emergency preparedness training for its personnel.

Emergency Medicine Training by MPGIMER, MUHS Medical Team

To enhance the medical and emergency response capabilities of the police recruits, a team of emergency doctors and specialists from the Maharashtra Post Graduate Institute of Medical Education & Research (MPGIMER), under the Maharashtra University of Health Sciences (MUHS), Nashik, was invited to conduct intensive sessions

The doctors delivered training in key areas such as:

- **First-response emergency care** — handling trauma, accidents, and critical incidents on the field.
- **Life-saving techniques** — basic life support (BLS), cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), and immediate stabilization measures.
- **Medical triage** — rapid assessment and prioritizing of casualties during mass-casualty events.
- **Coordination with health services** — working effectively with ambulance and hospital emergency teams.

These sessions aimed to equip police officers with essential skills to *act immediately and effectively when civilians are in distress or in life-threatening situations*, especially in the crucial minutes before professional medical help arrives.

Significance in Police Training

Such collaboration signifies a **holistic approach to public safety**, where police personnel don't just respond to crime but are also *trained as first responders in public health emergencies*. This is in line with modern policing goals that emphasize:

- **Quick and competent emergency care**

- **Reduced preventable mortality in accidents/disasters**
- **Improved police-community trust through compassionate action**

The involvement of a **medical institute like MPGIMER, MUHS Nashik** ensures that the training is **clinically sound and aligned with current emergency medicine standards**.
